

RURAL MUNICIPALITY OF HEART'S HILL No. 352

A BYLAW TO DESIGNATE A SITE AS MUNICIPAL HERITAGE PROPERTY

BYLAW No. 1/11

WHEREAS Sections 11 and 12 of the Heritage Property Act authorize the Council of a Municipality to enact bylaws to designate real Property, including all buildings, features and structures thereon, to be of heritage value: and,

Whereas the Council of the Rural Municipality of Heart's Hill No. 352 has determined that the property known as:

The Elk School located at the Northeast corner of the NE-09-35-27-W3, described as Parcel A, Plan No. 101390543 EXT 33

Is a unique historical site; and,

WHEREAS not less than (30) days prior to consideration of this bylaw, the Council of the Rural Municipality of Heart's Hill No. 352 has:

- a) served a Notice of Intention on the Registrar of Heritage property and all owners of property included in the proposed bylaw;
- b) published a Notice of Intention in at least one issue of a newspaper in general circulation in the municipality;
- c) registered an interest in the Land Titles Registry against all titles for the parcel of land included in the proposed bylaw; and,

WHEREAS no Notice of Objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Council of the Rural Municipality of Heart's Hill No. 352;

THEREFORE, the Council of the Rural Municipality enacts as follows:


There is designated as Municipal Heritage Property the real property legally described as:

The Elk School located at the Northeast corner of the NE-09-35-27-W3, described as Parcel A, Plan No. 101390543 Ext 33.

The reasons for the designation are as follows:


- a) It is uniquely located, as it is in the middle of the municipality and near a main highway.
- b) Built in 1914, and is the only one-room schoolhouse located within the municipality that is still structurally sound.
- c) Historically, has been a place of school, church services, dances, box socials, plays, meetings, voting poll, and sports events.
- d) Is used as a tourist attraction, with people stopping to admire its uniqueness and appreciating its heritage as a reminder of the perseverance of the local settlers.
